Ponderings from your Pastor

Dear Friends,

February is here, the month of Love, it is also the month of Ash Wednesday! We will be having an **Ash Wednesday Service at 7 pm on February 14, in the Sanctuary.** Also, please be aware that we have some special services in store for all of you during Lent. A calendar of events will be in the Bulletin soon.

During Lent, we will be delving into “24 Hours that changed the World”. Final plans for a Bible Study are in the works, please watch the Volunteer sign up for your opportunity to join the discussion.

I also want to invite you to a Review of our Goals and Goal Setting for 2018 and beyond, on **February 17, 2018, from 9:30 am to Noon, in the Multipurpose Room.**

The Leadership team thought it would be a good idea to continue to share with you some more about the reasons we are adopting the *Governance Board* structure that I spoke to you about last month.

The basis of our work is Biblical. Moses had to organize the children of Israel in order to lead them from slavery into a promised land. Jesus had to organize the disciples in order for them to share the good news of God's love. The church from its beginning has had to organize itself in such a way that the gospel is proclaimed. So, excellence governance (administration structure) must be joined to excellent ministry. Vital and vibrant ministry actually depends upon effective governance and effective leadership.

The organizational structure of our church was designed for a different cultural context. In the context of the 20th century, change was more predictable and occurred at a slower rate. Today, we live in a culture of rapid and unpredictable change. When new threats appear on the horizon and when new opportunities present themselves, the church needs organizational structure that is adaptable and flexible. Long chains of decisions making groups can get in the way when it is important to be flexible. Because large congregations like ours are not generally nimble, they are not well equipped to handle the changes that are required in the 21st century.

Under the Council Structure, our church had a Church Council of 22 members; a Staff Parish Relations Committee of 9, Trustees made up of 9 members, Finance Committee made up of 13 members, and a Nominations Committee made up of 9. Other Chair positions and missional areas included Nurture, Outreach, Worship and Witness. 62+ people, making decisions for the church!

On one hand, it sounds good to have so many people participating in our governance of the church, but the reality is that our church is not structured in a way that is appropriate for its size, and the Council model is not a system that supports our mission and vision.

Pastor's Ponderings Continued

Below are some additional reasons for restructuring our Leadership Structure:

- There are many administrative meetings to attend, where it seems people have the same questions, with little accountability.
 - With a more centralized leadership, major decisions of finance, building repairs, and other large decisions are left with the Leadership Team. But day today decisions are left to the pastor, who has empowered the missional area leaders (Directors) to make decisions based on the mission and vision.
- Our young families that we do have do not have time to participate in the meetings. With very little free time, even if they wanted to, they could not be a Sunday School Teacher and serve on any administrative committees.
 - This new model will allow more people to be in actual ministry.
- As our congregation gets older there are fewer and fewer people who agree to be a part of the many committees. For the last three years, we have been unable to fully fill each committee with the required number.
 - We know everyone is more open to short term projects and events. The governance model has a 3 year, class rotation of leadership; this will provide a method for new leadership every year.
- We also remember all the vision statements that have been worked on and then left in the dust never to be seen again.
 - This new model uses the vision and mission to drive our work.
- We noticed that the larger the group, the fewer number of people who shared ideas or spoke letting a few speak, and many others remain silent.
 - The new model is based on an open style of communication with accountable leadership.
- It takes a long time and a lot of meetings to make a decisions.
 - Major decisions are always made by the Leadership Team, but day-to-day ministry decisions with defined boundaries are made by the Pastor.
- We realized that is it rare for any of the committees to have “Big Picture” discussions. Most meetings consist of reporting and doing the tasks at hand. It is rare that the question, “*are we doing the right things to move toward our vision*” is asked. It is rare for us to hold any group or position accountable for moving the church toward the vision.
 - This new model will focus all ministry and goals towards the vision and the mission of making disciples.

Over a year ago, Rev. Mary McInnes presented Church Council with a way to reduce the present structure in such a way that it will empower the ministry and focus it on the mission of “making disciples for Jesus Christ” by seeking to fully become our Vision. “*Welcoming, accepting, caring and diverse Christian Community committed to teaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, to all people through faith based worship, exciting programs and outreach ministry.*”

She gave Council the model contained in a book entitled, “Leadership and Organization for Fruitful Congregations”. She also suggested the church wait until Rev. Maureen came as she was trained in the process and had assisted several churches larger than ours to implement the model.

This new model is helping us make better decisions faster, keeping the mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ in the forefront of our minds, and always striving to improve at living out the vision. “*Welcoming, accepting, caring and diverse Christian Community committed to teaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, to all people through faith based worship, exciting programs and outreach ministry.*”

I hope this has helped you understand better what is happening at the Leadership Level of the church. My door is always open and the Leadership or myself are always willing to answer any of your questions as we go on to “Christian Perfection”.

Family Spotlight of the Month

Hello, fellow members of First United Methodist Church of Mount Clemens! We are the Lynch Family and we have been asked to tell you about ourselves as a way of getting to know more about us.....whether you are interested or not! :)



Marty and I just celebrated our fortieth (40th) wedding anniversary in October of 2017. We met at Central Michigan University in 1968-69 as freshmen. Marty grew up in Mayville, Michigan, where he lived on the homestead farm started by his great-great grandfather, Daniel Lynch, in 1855 after Daniel came over from Ireland. Marty had four brothers and two sisters, he being the eldest (and most handsome, for sure). Marty attended Mayville Methodist Church on Main Street until heading off to CMU after graduation.
